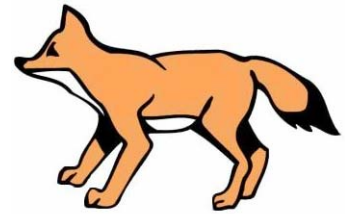

As the event is scheduled at the same time as our September meeting, we are considering substituting the regional conference for our meeting. In the next several months we will have more details and poll our members interest in attending, working out details for registration, travel, carpooling, costs, etc. This may offer an opportunity for some of our local members, as well as those who live outside of the Fox Valley to attend a major computer conference. It will be held in Chicago Heights at Prairie State College.

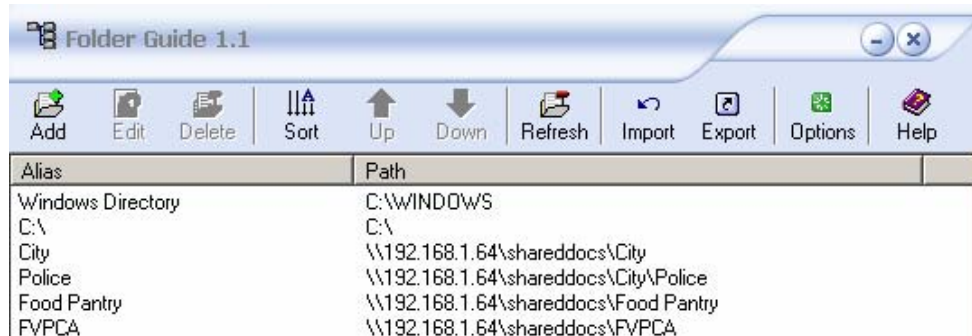

My Favorite Utility...

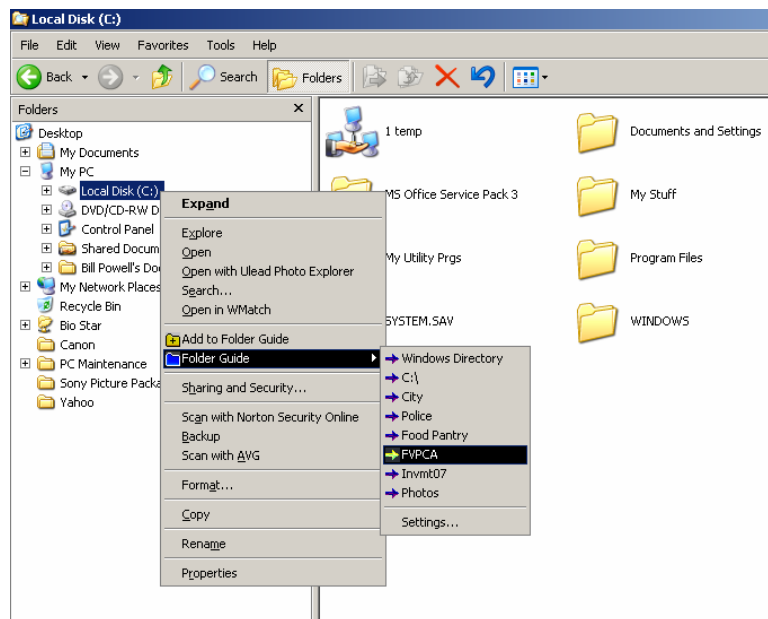
There are many utilities that make your PC life easier. One that I like is called **Folder Guide**. In essence, it creates shortcuts to quickly drill down windows explorer tree (identify the desired path) folders that you use most often. Since I have many folders and subfolders it really saves me a lot of time and clicking to get to the folder I want.

As you can see in the figure below, to add a folder just click on the add icon in the menu bar.



Once you have created the **Folder Guide** shortcuts, just right click within windows or even other programs such as MS Word, and the shortcut menu appears.

Last night's 10 o'clock news had a story about Sprint Nextel and Clearwire and their venture to launch a nationwide WiMax network offering enhanced broadband to cell phones and laptops. See the article summarizing this technology later in this newsletter.

Tom Anzalone recently signed our user group up with the O'Reilly User Group. This program will allow us to get free copies of books for us to review. An interested member would examine the book and then write a review which we would post in our newsletter, and also send a copy of the review to O'Reilly. Our group would be entitled to discounts on O'Reilly products purchased directly from them. Additionally, they regularly donate books and other promotional items for raffles or auctions to help our group raise money. We're looking forward to their latest catalog so that we may begin to participate in this program. Some of their authors may be willing to speak at one of our meetings. We will be posting a banner on our website and encourage our members to review their books and post reviews on Amazon, our site, or our newsletter.

A few months ago we gave Craig McGregor a copy of, "Mavis Beacon Teaches Typing" (a typing tutor program.) One condition of this software "gift" was that he prepare a short program explaining its use. Craig will present his program at our May meeting. I missed the opportunity to take a typing class in high school, and have played with typing tutors. I am not a great typist by any means, but the program did help improve my skills somewhat. I still use Dragon Naturally Speaking, a speech recognition program, for long typing sessions. (Like writing newsletter articles!)

Recently, I have had problems with an older HP 2100 LaserJet printer. It came with a JetDirect network card. Even though I used the latest JetDirect software from HP, I was having problems printing to the 2100. This printer has a parallel port print connection, so I could have hooked it up to my computer and shared it through that computer across my network. However, that would mean I would have to have the "host" computer on all of the time for other computers to print to the 2100. I decided to install a 1-port 10/100 Mbps parallel port print server. While I was at it, I decided to install a 1-port USB 2.0 print server on my HP 7550 PhotoSmart printer, which I had set up as a share on my network. I will detail the steps on how to set up a network and then set up one of these print servers as a brief program at our May meeting.

We have renewed our subscription with our Domain Name Registrar so that our website (fvpc.org) remains active. (Ours expired around April 25th.) Typically, when you set up a webpage and want to have a friendly URL, you need to register that name with a Domain Name Registrar (providing no one else has used - register that URL.) At the present time, we have not deployed the good work done by our friend in England, Ivan Rood. He recently contacted me and wanted to know the status of our updated website project. There have been other distractions, so I have not been able to set up a local server to test the functionality of the new website. I also need to take the time to learn some PHP basics. Once that is done we will proceed to move ahead with our revised website. Any members who have web development experience and know some PHP basics are invited to contact me, so that we can work with Ivan and move ahead.

Our thanks to Norm Hoube for his program on "Interesting Internet Locations" at last month's meeting. Be sure to visit the GCFLearnFree.org site which provides an interactive learning experience to build the skills and confidence needed to function in the world today. You have the freedom to learn what you want, when you want, absolutely free. He also provided a handout with links to some locations that may be of interest to our members. We will see if we can put some of those links on our website.

Tip for Missing Desktop Icons

After adjusting the screen resolution on my computer to try out another setting for game play, the icons for my desktop shortcuts disappeared. (Desktop – Properties – Settings – Screen Resolution.) I tried several repairs including going to My Computer - Disk Properties - Tools – Error Checking – Selecting both options and re-booting, but the icons were still missing. So I Googled the problem and came up with this solution:

There is a folder where Windows keeps a collection of your icons, and sometimes it gets a little garbled. You need to get Windows to load fresh copies into the file.

In XP, right click a blank spot on your Desktop, and select Properties from the pop-up menu. Click on the Appearance tab, and then click on the Effects button. Find the box "Use large Icons", and click it (whether or not it is checked) then click Apply. Your icons will ripple and change size, but will become the correct ones. You can repeat the process to put the icons back to the original size.

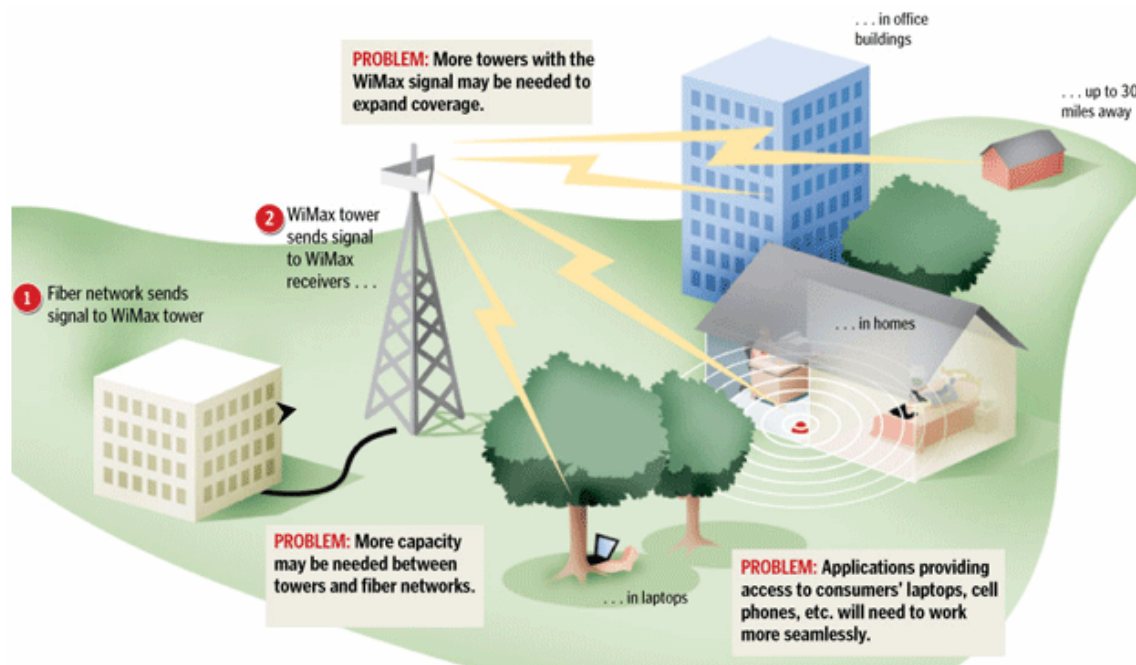
However, you may need to re-arrange the icons to suit your preference. This solved my problem!

WiMax pursued by Sprint Nextel and Clearwire

WiMax technology promises faster wireless service over greater distances and for more users, but there are some potential bumps in the road. A look at how WiMax works and some of the uncertainties surrounding the technology:



If the \$12 billion venture formed by Sprint Nextel and Clearwire recently works out, your cell phone may turn into a far more powerful, versatile and perhaps costlier mobile device. Although the new wireless connection, called WiMax, should be much faster than what's available on today's cell phones, it won't be as fast or as reliable as the pipes that bring cable television, Internet and phone service into houses from the street. And though it is being tested now, expanded service is about two years away. The companies aren't saying how much the service will cost. A few analysts estimate it at \$40 to \$60 a month. At first, at least, it would most likely be an extra rather than a substitute for the monthly phone, Internet and paid television services that cost many customers \$150 to \$200 a month now.

Consumer advocates hope WiMax will help simplify various telecommunications and television subscription plans. Eventually, broadband wireless should allow consumers to cancel other subscription-based Internet and phone services, Chris Murray, senior counsel of [Consumers Union](#) said. Free Internet phone services like [eBay's Skype](#) along with Web-based video should be used over the network, he said. "The reason we've always been excited by broadband via wireless is not because it gives consumers the possibility to do a lot of new nifty things, but because it has the possibility of saving people a lot of money," Murray said.

However the many uncertainties that surround the technology make it unclear when that could occur. WiMax requires a complex and expensive technological infrastructure of cell towers and underlying fiber-optic systems that is expected to take at least two years to build before the service could be deployed to most areas of the United States.
